- The man with the best job in the country is the vice-president. All he has to do is get up every morning and say, 'How is the president?'
- This country has come to feel the same when Congress is in session as when the baby gets hold of a hammer.
- The more you observe politics, the more you've got to admit that each party is worse than the other.
- There ought to be one day just one when there is open season on senators.
- If stupidity got us into this mess, why can't it get us out?
- If I studied all my life, I couldn't think up half the number of funny things passed in one session of Congress.
