Fo those whose moment of Joy is having Lots of Money, their patron Saint has to be that famous New Yorker, sometime hero, Willie Sutton of Bank Robbery failure.

Willie Sutton was born in Queens New York in 1901. He died 1980 unrecognized.

He had spent half his life on prison, though he escaped three times, always recaptured. He is quoted "I robbed banks because I loved it. I loved everything about it. To me the money was the chips, that's all. Go where the money is, and go there often."

Willie Sutton dressed well, was polite. In retirement he stated that the guns used to rob banks were never loaded, as he wanted no one to get hurt. Police, juries, criminals, liked Willie. At one arrest and conviction, he stated to the Court, "Thank you, your Honor, God Bless You".

Following one escape from prison, later walking the streets of New York, he was recognized by Arnold Schuster, on 2-05-1954. In Schuster's TV appearance, he relating his participation in the apprehension of Sutton, so offended the Mafia, they had Schuster killed 2-29-1954.

Sutton's last conviction was suspended in 1969. He lived quietly in Florida with his sister, until dying in 1980. Sutton did make some anti-robbery commercial for banks. Willie still knew "That's where the money is."

Today, is anyone using Sutton's slogan, "Go where the money is!"?

## Are you watching TV?
