Although I continue to "do my own thing" and consider myself to be healthy, it was prudent to take care of those decisions before the need arose for someone to make decisions for me and my care based on my preferences and desires expressed in legal documents. Currently, I am still the "guardian" of my retirement in an Active Adult Community where I can choose to come and go, do or not do whatever suits my fancy. Also, I have become a part of the changing of guard for a neighbor for whom I provide some home care so that she can remain in her home for as long as possible now that her health precludes her from doing and managing many things for herself.

Changing of the guard is inevitable in the many facets of our lives from grown children marrying and having their own families to "guard," up through the changing of government officials. No matter what the level, guard means "to watch over in order to protect against damage or harm." Let us be the type of guardian to ourselves and others that we wish to see in those who are our guardians.
