My husband and I spent an evening at the movies last weekend. We had a pleasant surprise with the viewing of *Green Book*. The movie is based on the life of professional pianist and composer, Don Shirley and an Italian American named Tony Vallelonga. Tony was hired to drive the African American pianist on a concert tour from New York City to Alabama and back. The movie takes place in 1962, a time of extreme racial tension, and change. The characters are portrayed convincingly by Viggo Mortensen (Tony) and Mahershala Ali (Don Shirley).

The characters are as different as night and day. Tony "Lip" got his nickname, as he brags, "I am the best bull-shitter." On the other hand, Don Shirley is a gifted and highly educated musician with three PhD's.
