My parents and I enjoyed visits with friends and relatives in other cities in the 1940's, 1950's and 1960's but were limited in the number of miles we could travel by automobile as there were so few decent places that would allow overnight stays, and it was unsafe for a Black woman to travel alone. A 50-mile distance by automobile was good at best. An overnight stay was with relatives or friends.

My parents refused to be subjected to the conditions of a segregated train. Bus travel was just as bad with segregated or no eating facilities in the small towns through which we had to travel. The best way to eat while traveling on the road was to carry your own food. A monumental task for any family. Therefore, our places to go were limited.

Today, race relations are different and travel accommodates us all. With time and money, "you can steer yourself any direction you choose."

Further lines from Dr. Seuss read: "You have brains in your head, feet in your shoes, you're on your own, you know what you know and you're the one who'll decide where to go. You're off to great places, today is your day, and your mountain is waiting so get on your way."

My children and millions like them, whose parents and grandparents did not have the luxury of safe travel in their childhood, appreciate the positive approach to guaranteed success. A whopping 98-3/4% percent guaranteed success in live traveling anywhere on the globe. And we are the ones who'll decide where to go.
